## Chairman's chat:

#### The Last resting place of Coventry's transport pioneer's...and more!

After the Xmas festivities I found myself enjoying some exercise and fresh air at the London Road cemetery in Coventry. My eldest child works for Historic England so a walk around any historic site is like a bus man's holiday. And it really is quite a pleasant place for a stroll, not just grave stones and monuments, but also some rare and very ancient specimens of trees...most with horticultural information. The site has received some Heritage funding of late, with useful and informative plaques dotted around the grounds I came across some war graves of pilots of the Royal Flying Core and the Royal Australian Flying Core killed in action in



France in the first world War. The graves and monuments of Coventry's forefathers include George Singer involved in early Bicycle and Motorcycle production, who's name was given to various motor cars during the post war years. Walter Brandish runner up in the 1922 500cc TT aboard a Triumph.

James Starley described as the father of the British bicycle, and inventor of the



differential gear....amongst other things. John Kemp Starley (nephew) developed a safer bicycle than that of the high mounted 'penny farthing' type, with 16" wheels and a diamond frame....Still a recognisable design and became known as the Rover safety bicycle.

Other memorials that caught my eye was for an unfortunate man who was trampled by an Elephant, and another for a woman who managed to get mauled by a Tiger....and not one built at Meriden.

#### Bargain carb.?.....Tony Harris explains

But the end of last Autumn I needed a carburettor for my rigid T80/T100 project. The carb I had on was a very worn Monoblock. These are now about £300 new. The alternative was a new Concentric but these are over £200 now. You can also get Wassell ones which are a bit cheaper.

Trawling Ebay I have seen copies of the Keihin power jet flat sided carburettor. I suspect these are made in the east but they can be picked up new between £18 and £30. Yes you have read correctly.

I contacted one of the advertisers and asked about jetting for a Triumph 500 twin and he replied back not just with settings but a link to lots of bikes and there settings,

He says these have been used on these bikes and pictures were enclosed. They are quite a bit smaller than the Monoblock.

For that price I thought give it a go. I wanted a 1" (26mm ) for the Triumph and he sent just that with quite a few main and pilot jets just in case I needed to tweek the settings. Check this set up link out. <u>https://www.jrcengineering.com/technical-support/jrc-pwk-carb-instructions/</u>

It came quite quickly and I could not believe what good quality these are. Really nicely made. I have fitted the carb and ordered a 30mm one for my 650 Triumph special. See them under Keihin PWK. I will report back when the weather gets warmer (about April/May) and let you know how I get on. At that price it's worth a try. Tony.



#### A tale from an ex-dispatch rider

Before I retired I cycled to work most of the time (*writes Neil Ives*). The ride to my last place was a ten miler. I thought cycling was keeping me fit and I'm sure it did my cardiovascular system a lot of good but now I'm suffering from arthritis in my knees and ankles!

Mind you, it's possible that my time as a motor-cycle dispatch rider when I was younger may have something to do with those joints suffering now. I was employed during a winter period to ride a Honda 500 Four, (supplied by the employer) between Norfolk and various offices around London to collect newspaper and magazine 'copy' which was to be printed at my employers press. I was sometimes doing over a thousand miles a week. After sitting on that motorbike in freezing conditions, (rain, hail, snow & sleet) for say three hours I sometimes could hardly get off the thing!

I have a memory from that job of a time late one Friday evening: Friday was a particularly busy day with something like 20 pickups around London. I had stopped at the last street lights on the north of London to adjust my clothing, clean my helmet visor and make sure the bikes luggage boxes were properly locked.

Writing that reminds me of the incident when they were not properly locked!. In the winter the air in a big city is noticeably warmer than the countryside: looking behind me I could see the comforting yellow tunnel of light leading back into the warm city; ahead was freezing darkness! The roads were deserted, a cold northerly wind was blowing sleet at me and I was tired. I had a lonely two hour ride ahead of me. I felt so sorry for myself I had to hold back tears and really force myself to go on.

## "Boxing Day Trial"

Most years I (*Andy Bean*) and friends try to attend the Boxing Day trial held usually at Ufton near Southam, however this year it was held at the Leamington Victory Club's land off the B4100 near Oakley Wood just south of Bishops Tachbrook, Leamington Spa. The club used to own a building in Bishops Tachbrook which they used as a club house, this was sold a number of years ago and they subsequently purchased a field off the B4100 just south of Oakley Wood to use as a venue for grass track meetings and the occasional trials practise day.

The weather was sunny and not raining for a change. Richard picked me up at about 09.30 for a 10.00 start. When we got there riders were unloading their bikes and starting them up – or trying to start them. Most bikes were modern and all were solos, no chairs! We only spotted two classics, a Francis Barnet and a Royal Enfield. In the past there had been numerous Tiger Cubs, BSA C15's, Greeves and the like but this

year only the Fanny B and Enfield. Possibly the riders did not want to get their classics dirty!!!"

There was quite a mixture of riders from young to old with a sprinkling of young ladies and teenage girls all having a go. After chatting with one or two of the riders and inspecting the sections we made our way back to the car and warm, by this time our feet were getting rather cold. Regards Andy.



## **<u>Rigid and girder diaries</u>**

Well it's Sunday morning, sun's shining, dog walked, breakfast eaten, and it's the Warwickshire section Autumn Run. When I saw this event at the start of the year, it was very much penciled in on my calendar... TBC, weather dependent.

Off down the workshop (garage) and get my 1937 Ariel Red Hunter out. Check tyres and oil levels etc. Today is going to be its second run since a total winter rebuild. Get my gear on, push her out onto the road, turn fuel on, give her a good tickle (the bike), and a good swinging kick, and she fires up first time, down to a nice steady tick over. Got to be a good omen for today's ride. Off down to Spon End to meet up with Ken and his lads: Ken will be on his 1928 BSA 500 Sloper (for a change), Elliot on his 1932 BSA Blue star, and Jordan on his 1930 BSA 500 Sloper. Arrive at the shop, everyone's ready to go. We set out onto the ring road with Ken in the lead (as usual) and onto the Banbury Road. These girder fork bikes do sound and look the part, but also hop along at a good pace too! We soon arrive at the Long Itch diner which is the start point for the club run.



Nice to see a good selection of bikes, alongside our own vintage bikes, fascinating the local power rangers on their modern sports/tourers. However, a cautionary note – many of these newer machines have telescopic front forks, and what I believe is called plunger (?) or swinging arm (?!) rear suspension. Be warned – these are only passing crazes (like coil ignition, and even electric start – god forbid!). The only way forward is backwards (rigid and girder) - so if you own one, start using it, and if you don't then get one and see what you've been missing out on!

After a short natter and a quick brew, everyone is ready to take off, us on the older bikes bringing up the rear. A route had been drafted taking us roughly 40 miles along Warwickshire's finest roads, which in the perfect riding weather, was absolutely fantastic. Most were utilising the drop off system, we 4 didn't but managed to stick together as a group, creating a great sight, sound, and smell for all to enjoy. Time flew by, and we soon arrived at The Fox and Hen in Bascott and into a nice large car park and seating area. We parked the bikes up and met some more members who had made their own way there. It was difficult to believe it was Autumn – aside from the chat of heating allowances and plans for Christmas, you'd never have guessed! After a couple of hours sitting outside and having a good chat in perfect weather it was time to head back to Coventry.

Instead of returning along the Banbury Road, we went along the lanes, over Hunningham Hill across the Fosse, down to Baginton Village, onto the Leamington Road, and back into Spon End. All our bikes ran well – a perfect day out with the Warwickshire Section.

#### Smith's Law of Autojumbles

#### **Section A: Punters**

- 1. A desired item purchased at one stall will be found cheaper at the next but one stall.
- 2. A desired item not purchased initially will not be found elsewhere and on return will have been sold.
- 3. Items purchased on the stall holder's verification will later prove to be the wrong size, model or year.
